ITH the summer vacation season ended, numismatists be turning their attention to the new auction season and the resumption of club meetings and activities. The New York area will be treated to a number of inviting sales and, with acnumber of valuable collections already listed to go on the block, these events are certain to attract many foreign as well as domestic buyers.

Stack's will get the hammer swinging with a mail-bid and floor auction of the Art Lovi collection of paper money and other unusual lots in the Manhattan-Skyline Suites of the Park Sheraton Hotel, Seventh Avenue and 56th Street next Friday and Saturday. Friday's session will begin at 7 P.M. and Saturday's at 12:30. Benjamin Stack, Harvey Stack and Donald D'Amato will serve as auctioneers.

Coming Up

After that weekend, Stack's will be looking ahead to next month, when it will auction the R. L. Miles Jr. collection (Part I-gold) of United States monies. This event will take place in the Park Sheraton on Oct. 25-26. They plan to auction Part II, which consists of United States copper, nickel and silver, in April of 1969.

The rarest of the Morgan silver dollars, the 1893-S, is listed to go under the hammer. The second session of the sale, also starting at 7 P.M., will be of gold, silver, and copper coins of the world. Among the foreign items catalogued is a 1765 banco-thaler of Prussia in bril- . liant, proof-like condition. It bears the bust of Frederick the Great on the obverse side and an eagle on the reverse. Among the pieces up for sale is the 1935 Silver Jubilee commemorative of George V, struck in gold. This coin (pictured below) bears the heads of the King and Queen on the face side and an engraving of a castle on the reverse. Among the miscellaneous lots is a St. Gaudens \$20 gold piece of 1907.

CONAN-DOYLE

More than 500 items are in the collection of the late Sir Arthur Conan-Doyle, author of the Sherlock Holmes stories, which has been acquired by Manfra, Tordella & Brookes, Inc., of this city.

Among these ancients is a huge half-pound bronze Roman—made between 222 and 205 B.C. This money is engraved with the head of Janus, the two-faced god, on the obverse side and the prow of an old war galley on the reverse. Another interesting rarity is a denarius from the time of Mark Antony and Cleopatra.

Practically every coin in the collection is ticketed in Sir Conan-Doyle's own writing. The items have been catalogued and will be offered in the company's new fall price list.
